Andrzej has deep commercial expertise in agribusiness and food industry ranging from the commodity side to the value added products, profound knowledge of the region as well as strong expertise in the global

agricultural supply chain. His work in Bunge includes regional management of soft seeds crush value chain and acting as the country director for several countries, including Ukraine.

ANSWER THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS:**Why do you think membership in the American Chamber of Commerce is important for businesses operating in Ukraine?**

I always remained focused on Ukraine and was closely following political and economic developments in the country where I lived for 10 years. I further believe it is important that the Board gets proportional voice of all industries including agriculture being one of the key industries for the country. In this role my focus would be on improving the regulation for existing investors and addressing key challenges related to grain exports, de-mining and ensuring ongoing farming, availability of workforce, availability of insurance etc. I am willing to devote my vast experience and strategic view of the agricultural sector for the benefit of the Chamber's members. Ukraine is facing many challenges due to the war and ACC is instrumental to keep focus of the Government over key industry and social priorities.

Why do you feel you are qualified to serve on the Chamber Board? What skills would you bring to the Board?

As a long-term CEO of the key market players and investors in agriculture and food sectors in Ukraine, I am fully committed to provide strategic guidance and leadership for the Board on the variety of agricultural and infrastructural issues. In the past I worked closely with the ACC's Agriculture Committee to improve situation with the VAT reimbursement. I am convinced that my continued focus on the issue of VAT, improving logistics and rail transportation, and maintaining the Black Sea Corridor with the support from the US Government, the European institutions, and the IFIs is instrumental in solving the matter.

How have you been active in the Chamber over the course of the last two years?

Bunge has always been active in the Agricultural, Infrastructural and Tax Committees of the ACC also co-chairing some of these Committees. The martial state prompted us to switch more to the online communication but once the situation improves, I hope we can get back to in-person communication as well. As a Board member I have been an active participant of the Board meetings and keep high priority to the ag issues and also talking to various think tanks, agencies and donors working on providing aid to Ukraine.

What activity or Committee would you participate in and be responsible for?

As the CEO with a solid background in agriculture, I would like to be responsible for this industry and the Agricultural and/or the Infrastructure Committees of the Chamber.
